

Dear Parents, Families, Students and Staff,

In Mr White's newsletter two weeks ago, he wrote about empathy being at the heart of the strategy of using our emotional intelligence, which is what we promote here at Holy Family. We are powerful in the way we use empathy to reflect our school values of positive emotion, trust, and support. We are here to support each other, as well as all our learners, in the way our catholic ethos directs us to by supporting those that are most vulnerable in society and this is certainly true for our setting.

As we nurture our empathy we remember the example of our greatest influencer, Jesus. Jesus always put the marginalised in society first. In my current studies we are learning about Catholic social teaching in which Jesus' message is underpinned. The four key principles are human dignity, the common good, subsidiarity and solidarity. This week sees the commencement of the NAPLAN testing for years 3 and 5 classes. Whilst it is not a measure of a students' true worth as a learner, it will be beneficial in providing a snapshot of data that we need to progress our teaching and learning. It provides answers to questions such as where are the gaps in learning and how can we as a staff close these learning gaps? We will always strive to do better in our approach to learning and teaching and this tool assists us in doing so.



At Holy Family we understand that learning comes in many forms and that children use their hundred languages to express what they know and what they want to know. We believe that every child is a competent citizen from birth and comes with a wealth of knowledge that must be nurtured and cultivated by us the teachers, educators, and leaders of Holy Family.

We only have to walk into the amazing pre-school room here at the school and we see the educators and pre-school teachers being directed to the many different tables of provocations by the children themselves that are showing their interests, their passions, their hundred languages.

This week we also held our AGM for school board. We welcomed some new attendees and reflected on the 2023 school year and highlighted the many changes and initiatives we do here at Holy Family. Please refer to the links on the next page to read the reports.

Lastly, just a reminder that yard supervision by teachers and leaders commences at 8:15am so if children need to be brought to school prior to 8:15am they must be booked into OSHC.









# FROM THE APRIM

Dear Parents and Caregivers,

God loved the world so much that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not be lost but may have eternal life. For God sent his Son into the world not to condemn the world, but so that through him the world might be saved.





As we reflect on last Sunday's Gospel, we are reminded that we will become less overwhelmed when we open ourselves to God's love in our lives. Through Jesus, we witness a better way to live, one that does not condemn, but gives life and hope. Even though as humans we make mistakes time and time again, we take comfort in the knowledge of God's unending love and mercy. In our lives, we have glimpses of this love through the special bonds we share with our children and grandchildren. Often, we find that our love for them is so overwhelming that we would do anything for them. Through this experience, we better understand God's merciful love for us all. As we continue our Lenten journey, let us reflect on the times where we have experienced the personal love of Christ in our lives, and how this love has inspired us to share the joy of the Gospel with others.



Next week is Harmony Week and our school is preparing for a range of rich and engaging activities that help create an awareness and celebration of our country's diverse multiculturalism. The theme this year is "Everyone Belongs" and it highlights the importance of promoting inclusion of all people within our school community. Harmony Day actually originated in Australia in 1999 and was inspired by the International Day for the Elimination of Racial Discrimination declared by the United Nations. The colour orange is used as it symbolises communication, meaningful conversation and mutual respect between all people. At Holy Family Catholic School, we have a Harmony Day competition for students to enter and the winners will be announced at next Friday's Harmony Day assembly, where children are invited to wear their cultural dress, orange clothing or school uniform. There is also an Aboriginal artist who will be working with classes, groups of children visiting the Pines Lakes Community Centre to perform as part of the Vietnamese Intergeneration program, a Harmony Day prayer liturgy and a special canteen menu of Butter Chicken or Chickpea Curry and orange

jelly. Families are also invited to share a story, dance or other cultural experience with small groups of children throughout the week. We would love to see as many families as possible at the Harmony Day morning tea in the staff room at 9am on Tuesday.

#### What's been happening in OSHC;

Over the last couple of weeks, the children and educators have been exploring the importance of well-being through our school and OSHC (Out of School Hours Care) values and expectations. We asked families to provide insights into their values at home and as part of their families. From this, we learned that positive connections and relationships are important to the families. Therefore, we aim to support these values through the learning environment.

As part of supporting relationships, we have created a pet wall and a favourite memory wall to build a sense of belonging in the centre. The children and educators are so happy to share. We have been exploring what kindness means through activities such as creating kindness cards for the educators, acknowledging International Words Day.

Over the past couple of weeks, the children within our service have been showing great interest in animals within their surrounding environments. We had



extended this interest by creating a sensory table. The sensory table included materials such as farm animal pasta, playdough, and plastic farm animals. The children have requested sensory play activities in the afternoon. We have been exploring with different natural materials. The children have been enjoying making and exploring cloud dough and shaving cream, rice creations, and playdough.

- Morning bookings will have an SMS with an <u>approximate</u> pick up time sent the day before.

- Orders need to be placed by 9am via the QKR App and phone or in person by 10am at the latest to ensure the order can be supplied.

#### OPTIMISM IN LIFE

Learning from St. Joseph & St. Francis de Sales

Dear beloved Parishioners, Friends and Visitors,

In his letter to the Colossians Ch. 3:1-3, St. Paul says: Set your heart on what pertains to higher realms. Be intent on things above rather than things of earth. This is an ardent invitation for all of us to continue our lives with a sense of confident optimism. As St. Paul says again: Let us not grow weary of doing good, for things will turn out well in due time. Optimism comes from the Latin root optimus, meaning "best." Optimism is the attitude of believing, expecting or hoping for the best. It describes how an optimistic person always looks for the best in any situation and expects good things to happen. This week, we celebrate the feast of St. Joseph, who trusted God and was optimistic about life.

I belong to a missionary religious order with St. Francis de Sales as my patron. Optimism is a major pillar of our Spirituality, and St. Francis de Sales is a beacon of this optimistic spirit. His positive world vision, gentleness, and humaneness made him a saintly stalwart of optimism. St. Francis de Sales believed that God's goodness is everywhere, and it is not the world that spoils us, but we spoil ourselves and the world. Remember his oft-quoted axiom: What you are is God's gift to you; what you will be is your gift to God. The good nature that God has blessed us with should be sustained. Instead of worrying about our emptiness or mental distress, let us fill our minds with goodness, peace and the fullness of God's love.

My dear friends, with everything that happens to us right now, it wouldn't be an easy job to be an optimist. When you encounter difficulties and struggles as you undertake your life's works, I wish you would neither be desperate nor impatient. Like St. Joseph, let's put our trust in the Lord. I always try to look at life situations in the following manner: You may be surprised that you gradually lose your hair as you grow older. But think of a young cancer patient who loses their entire hair due to radiation or chemotherapy! Should we not be grateful to God for the many blessings we have, knowing that many unpleasant situations could have been worse?

Let us be confident optimists. St. Francis de Sales says: True progress quietly and persistently moves along without notice. God works powerfully and mysteriously. Often, we don't realise the changes He's making in our lives while they're happening, but when we look back, we see how He has led us. But if we despair in the moment, we are making no progress; we might become discouraged and give up. By keeping our focus outward on God and others instead of ourselves, we create space for God to do His work in us, fostering a sense of selflessness and humility. I wish you all a happy feast of St. Joseph.

Wishing that this lent becomes a time of confident optimism for all of us, With love and prayers.



### **Student Absence Options**



Students are expected at school for an 8:50am start. Should your child be absent or late to school for any reason (illness, appointments, family events or holidays) please advise the front office by any of these following methods:

- \* For any absences longer than 2 school days please use this link



If your child arrives after 8:50am please bring them via the front office to sign them in. Failure to do so will result in an absent SMS being sent.

### **Early Collection Guidelines**

- Advise the front office of your need to collect your child early. This can be done
  by phone, in person or email to <a href="mailto:absent@holyfamily.catholic.edu.au">absent@holyfamily.catholic.edu.au</a>
- Upon arrival please sign out the student via the iPad on the front desk and staff will call for your child to come to the front office if not already in Student Services.
- <u>Cancel any OSHC bookings</u> via the Xplor app and bus bookings will be forfeited.
- <u>Defer any lunch orders</u> (if before 10:00am)
   or have the lunch order collected to take home
   if canteen have it ready.

### **School finishes at 3pm**



The front entrance gate will be open by 2:30pm for families to enter the school to wait for their children on site. If needing to take your child early please sign them out before going to the classroom.

Carpark Gate 1 is opened as close to 2:30pm as possible. The gate leading to the Kiss and Drop Zone will be opened either at 2:45pm or when the school bus has arrived (whichever comes first).

The side and rear gates will be opened when the teacher on duty arrives just after 3pm.

Please make an OSHC booking if you cannot collect your child/children on time.

### **Pedestrian Safety**

Please use the footpath between the carpark and road when walking your children to the school gates

Use the pedestrian crossings to ensure everyone stays safe.

### Pick Up & Drop Off Safety

Use the Kiss & Drop driveway if you cannot get out of your car

This area is supervised and the safest way to drop off or collect your child while you stay in your car.
